## Getting Back in the Groove After the Break

As students get back into the groove of the new semester, we have some tips for parents that can help you get back on track for 2023.

- Read your student's IEP or 504. Front to back.
- Gather their IEP progress reports and compare them to their IEP goals. Are they making progress?
- Mark the date of the next Annual Review or Re-Evaluation date on your calendar.
- 3-4 weeks prior to the scheduled due date, share your preferred days and availability via email with the team. The meeting should be at a "mutually agreed upon time and place."
- Once the meeting is scheduled, request a draft of your annual IEP or 504 be sent to you at least 2 days prior to the meeting.
   Example "In preparation for the upcoming annual IEP scheduled for 1/1/23, please provide the DRAFT IEP by 12/29/22. Thank you and I look forward to seeing you all."
- Review the draft. If you do not get a draft of the IEP/504, you can ask to reschedule the meeting until you have time to review the documents.
- Take a picture of your child to the IEP meeting and place it in the center of the table. This will keep the focus on your child as an individual and their individualized needs.
- Get updated reports from your outside therapy agencies if applicable.
- Have your parent input, questions, and ideas ready to share with the team.
- Update your PTRC Parent Mentor with the meeting date, and any new concerns that you may have since you last spoke.

#### I Have an "IDEA!"

#### Let's talk acronyms!

It seems every week a Family Resource Center (FRC) Parent Mentor shares a new acronym they picked up in a meeting or during a training session. Acronyms are "an abbreviation formed from the initial letters of other words and pronounced as a word". We decided to take a closer look at the Special Education (SpEd) acronyms. Our Parent Mentors decided on the most commonly used acronyms that you may hear and can use with confidence in your meetings:

- IEP- Individualized Education Program
- IFSP- Individualized Family Service Plan
- FAPE- Free and Appropriate Public Education
- PLAAFP- Present Levels of Academic Achievement and Functional Performance
- · SSD- Shortened School Day
- BIR- Behavior Intervention Room
- LRE- Least Restrictive Environment
- IDEA- Individuals with Disabilities Education Act
- FBA- Functional Behavior Assessment
- BIP- Behavior Intervention Plan
- ESY- Extended School Year
- LEA- Local Educational Agency
- PWN- Prior Written Notice

But wait, there's more! We cannot stop with just the acronyms we have suggested, oh no! Special Education vocabulary is complex enough, adding confusing acronyms can increase barriers for even the most prepared caregiver. #### "One for All and All for One"

"Each individual should act for the benefit of the group and the group should act for the benefit of each individual."

Throughout our history, children and adults have often been excluded because of their race, gender, sexuality, or abilities. It wasn't until July of 1990, that the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) was signed into law. The ADA specifically "prohibits discrimination against people with disabilities in areas including employment, transportation, public accommodations, communications and access to state and local government programs and services." The ADA is the world's first comprehensive civil rights law for people with disabilities.

In preparation for the ADA in 1990, people with disabilities were first asked to document daily instances of how they experienced inaccessibility and discrimination in the community. Their diaries served not only as testimonials of discrimination, but also raised societies consciousness around their barriers to daily living.

The ADA paved the way and required business operators to provide equal access to people with disabilities. Thus, spurring the development and deployment of wheelchair lifts, apps to guide the blind through airports, and current smartphones that can help the deaf communicate. Cars and vans can now be skillfully modified and made fully accessible for people with disabilities to drive in the 21st Century.

"Accessibility" refers to facilities or amenities that can assist people with mobile or cognitive impairments to access all information without barriers. Surprisingly, the earliest law providing accessibility for people with disabilities was the "handicapped" parking in Delaware's 1955 Code, 2134.

A mere thirteen years later, after passage of the 1968 "Architectural Barriers Act", the federal government mandated parking spaces, signage, and curb cuts. This was also the

year the universal access symbol debuted.

#### One for All and All for One Cont'd

In summary, Accessibility is the "act of removing barriers through mindful design of products, devices, services, vehicles or environments". Comparably, Inclusivity means "children and adults of ALL abilities are welcomed and encouraged to attend, participate or apply no matter their physical, cognitive, social, or emotional development". The very act of being inclusive means everyone feels valued and respected as an individual.

In writing this article, the proverb "Necessity is the Mother of Invention" comes to mind. Which states that "the primary driving force for most new inventions is a need" and it is no surprise that parents of children with special needs are resilient, creative and persistent.

There are several accessible and inclusive organizations in the Tri-County you may be interested in:

#### **Central Creek Park**

Central Creek Park in Goose Creek, has over 26,000 square-feet of playgrounds and offers a wide range of accessible activities for people with physical or visual disabilities. The surfacing is all wheelchair accessible and the equipment is based on sensory items for everyone to enjoy. It is a world-class, 13-acre all-abilities recreational opportunity for everyone. We have heard only positive reviews after the grand opening in December. One resident shared "It was so awesome to see a playground that involved all children and the atmosphere was so happy." Another mother reports she observed her son and her older daughter "play on the same equipment because it was modified and safe for both of them." For more information follow this link or go to:

#### What is A "PWN?"

#### **Prior Written Notice (PWN)**

The Family Resource Center for Disabilities and Special Needs (FRCDSN) is dedicated to helping parents who contact us obtain the best understanding of their rights when it comes to disabilities and Special Education services. One of the most critical documents parents need to understand is the Prior Written Notice (PWN). According to IDEA, a PWN must include 7 things:

- 1. A description of the action proposed or refused by the school or LEA.
  - EX. The team agreed that a Behavior Intervention Plan is needed.
- 2.An explanation of why the school proposes or refuses to take action.
  - EX. The student has shown an escalation in behavior over the past three weeks.
- 3.A description of each evaluation procedure, assessment or report used to make their decision.
  - EX. Teacher observations, behavior data and team input was the basis for the proposed actions.

#### Prior Written Notice Cont'd

4.A statement that parents of a child with a disability have protections under the procedural safeguards and how parents can get a copy.

EX. A description of the procedural safeguards is provided upon initial referral and annually, thereafter.

5. Sources for parents to get help understanding these provisions or procedural safeguards. 6.A description of other options considered and the reasons why they were rejected.

EX. The team considered not putting a Behavior Intervention Plan in place but the team agreed the student needs an Behavior Intervention Plan because...

7.A description of other factors important to the school's proposal or refusal. [§300.503(b)] EX. Medication will continue and according to the parent, the effectiveness of the medication will improve with continued use.

IDEA describes FOUR situations when parents are entitled to and should receive a PWN.

- A school proposes to make a change in the identification, evaluation or educational placement of a child.
- A school refuses to make a change in the identification, evaluation or educational placement of a child.
- A school proposes to make a change to how a child is being provided a Free and Appropriate Public Education (FAPE).
- Parents should receive written notice AFTER a proposed change has been discussed by the team at an IEP meeting and BEFORE any changes are made. Parents may ask for written notice if the school tells them of changes they plan to make in a phone call, a meeting, an email or a conversation. Despite the name, the PWN should not be received prior to the meeting.

Not surprisingly, "there are times when parents may not agree with the school's recommendations about their child's education. "Under the law, parents have the right to challenge decisions about their child's eligibility, evaluation, placement, and the services that the school provides to the child." #### Continuum of Care Lowcountry-

In November, we were invited to provide a training workshop for the Wraparound Facilitators at Continuum of Care. We shared two hours discussing the importance of Special Education services to better equip their Facilitators in supporting their clients. CoC provides intensive care coordination through a care planning process called "Wraparound." Wraparound is a team based approach that involves children, families, supports, and professional service providers. Wraparound is for children with serious emotional or behavioral health diagnoses whose families need assistance keeping their children in their home, school, or community. If a child is currently out of their home or community. Wraparound can assist with planning for a successful return to his/her family, school, and friends.

#### **Great Kids and Awesome Adults**

The Family Resource Center was invited to the Great Kids and Awesome Adults annual retreat in November. Our Outreach Coordinator, Lisa Riddle, provided information and training to their Case Management and Early Intervention staff about our services and how a Parent Mentor works along side parents and caregivers during their Special Education disability journey.

Great Kids and Awesome Adults provides Early Intervention Services for BabyNet (Age 0-3) eligible children and continued Early Intervention to age 6 for children at risk for developmental delays and who are eligible through Dept. of Disabilities and Special Needs (DDSN).

#### Great Kids and Awesome Adults Cont'd

Recently, they have begun providing assistancewith eligibility determination for older individuals and case management services in some areas. Great Kids currently serves the Grand Strand, Lowcountry, and Pee Dee areas of South Carolina.

#### Family Connections-

Family Connections is designated by the U.S. Department of Education as South Carolina's Parent Training and Information Center (PTI).

The Family Information Center (FIC) serves as the central point to allow their team to determine your needs and connect you with the best resources. The FIC is staffed Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. – 5 p.m., by professionals, the majority of whom are parents themselves.

Family Connections has six specialized programs that serve South Carolinians:

- 1. Project Breathe Easy- This free and confidential home visitation program provides emotional and informational support to parents who have children with asthma.
- 2. Education Partners- Family Engagement Managers empower parents with tools, training, and support to help them understand and navigate the educational system.
- 3. Healthcare Connection- Their healthcare team offers assistance with Medicaid, TEFRA, appeals and managed care information.
- 4. Parents as Teachers- A unique home-school visitation partnership for parents of young children
- 5. Parent to Parent Support- Trained parent volunteers provide emotional support and information based on the child's needs.
- 6. NICU support- NICU parent navigators provide bedside support to parents who have, or recently had, a child in the NICU.
